# **Survey of Pennsylvania Voter Sentiment on Legislative Redistricting**

## **Summary of Findings**

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## Key Findings

This summary provides an overview of the findings of a survey of 901 Pennsylvania registered voters focused on attitudes about government reform, specifically emphasizing redistricting reform.

A large portion of Pennsylvania voters express support for reforming the procedures and practices of state government. Seven in ten (70%) registered voters believe state government needs reformed and sizable majorities support specific reforms to campaign finance laws, the operations of the state legislature, redistricting, and state and local government financing.

Given the support that voters express for reform of government in both general sentiment and for specific circumstances, it is consistent *that large portions (67%) support the use of an independent commission to draw state legislative district lines*, including majorities of Democrats, independents, and Republicans in every region of the state.

Responses to open-ended items about the current redistricting process suggest that *voters support redistricting reform because they believe redistricting is currently a partisan activity*; this notion is confirmed when respondents were directly asked about the way the current system functions. Most voters believe the current system of drawing legislative districts allows party leaders to put party interests ahead of voter interests (72%), creates polarization and gridlock (70%), lets elected officials choose their voters rather than voters choosing them (65%), and gives voters fewer choices on election day (62%).

These feelings are why three in five (59%) registered voters are more likely to vote for a legislator who votes to use an independent commission for redistricting.

## ***Voter Interest in Governmental Reform***

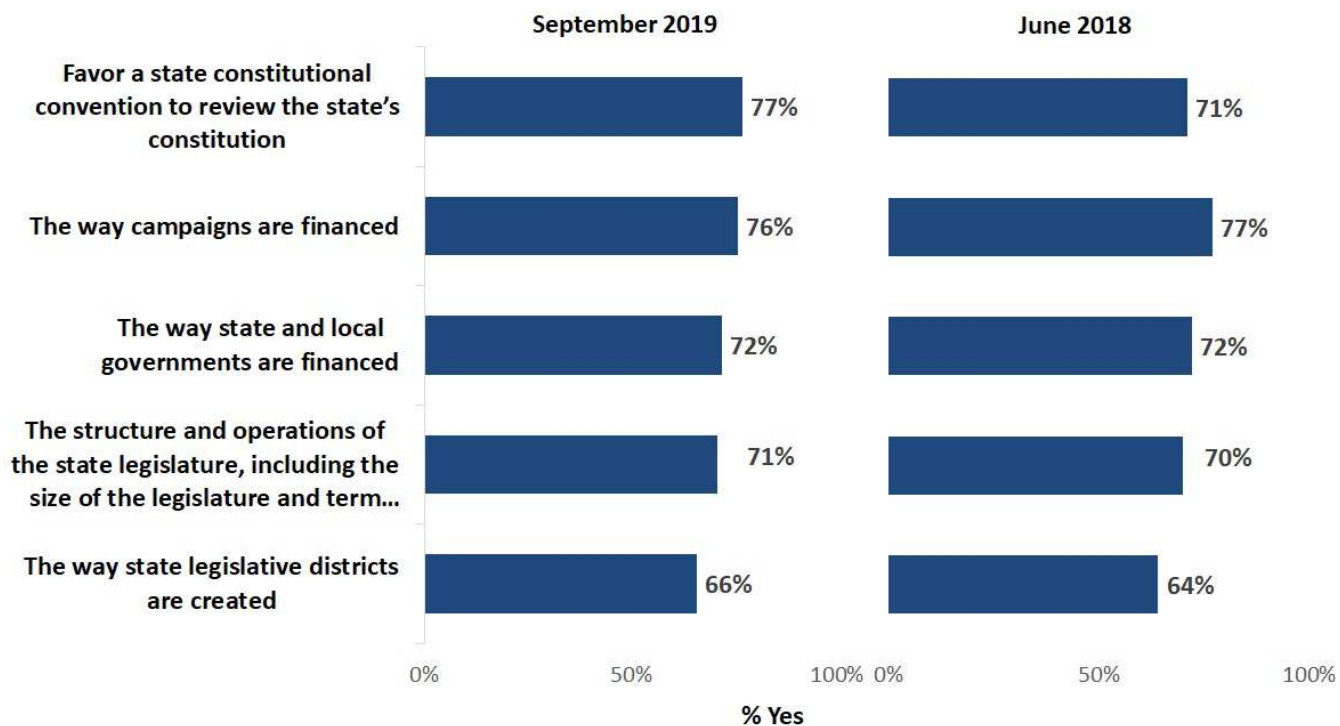
A large portion of Pennsylvania voters express support for reforming the procedures and practices of state government. Seven in ten (70%) registered voters believe state government needs reformed and sizable majorities support specific reforms to campaign finance laws, the operations of the state legislature, redistricting, and state and local government financing (see Figure 1). The desire for reform is so strong that more than three in four (77%) voters say they support a constitutional convention. Public support for such reforms has been consistently high over time.

*Do you think each of the following areas of state government need to be reformed, or not?*



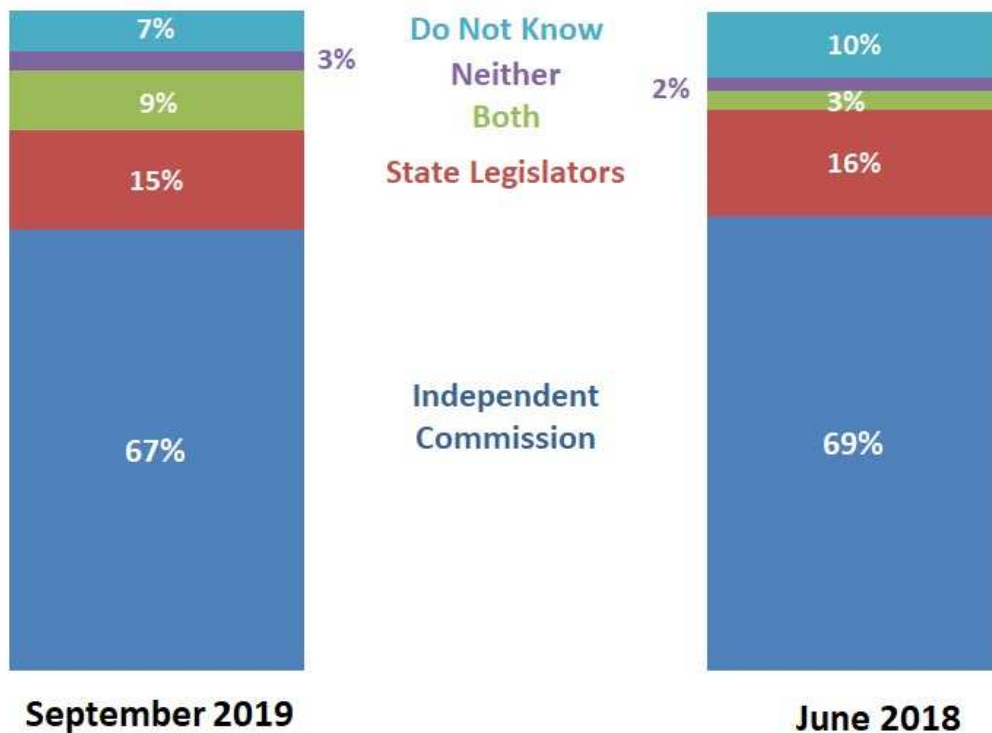
## Redistricting Reform

Given the support that voters express for reform of government in both general sentiment and for specific circumstances, it is consistent that large portions support the use of an independent commission to draw state legislative district lines (see Figure 2). A majority of Democrats, independents, and Republicans support the use of an independent commission to draw legislative boundaries. Table A-1 shows that support for using an independent commission is high across demographic, geographic, and political groups in the state.

Half (50%) of registered voters feel sufficiently knowledgeable to discuss how voter maps are drawn in the state.<sup>1</sup> Table A-2 shows differences in self-reported knowledge by demographic, geographic, and political characteristics. Nearly two in five registered voters who believe they are knowledgeable about how voter maps are drawn mentions some sort of partisan bias when they describe what they know and another one in four cite some sort of problem that results from current procedures. One in five voters says that an independent commission is the solution to how maps are currently drawn, while another one in five suggest partisanship needs to be removed from the process.

Responses to these open-ended items suggest that voters support redistricting reform because they view it as partisan and this notion is confirmed when respondents were directly asked about the way the current system functions. Figure 3 shows that most voters believe the current system of drawing legislative districts allows party leaders to put party interests ahead of voter interests, creates polarization and gridlock, lets elected officials choose their voters rather than voters choosing them, and gives voters fewer choices on election day.

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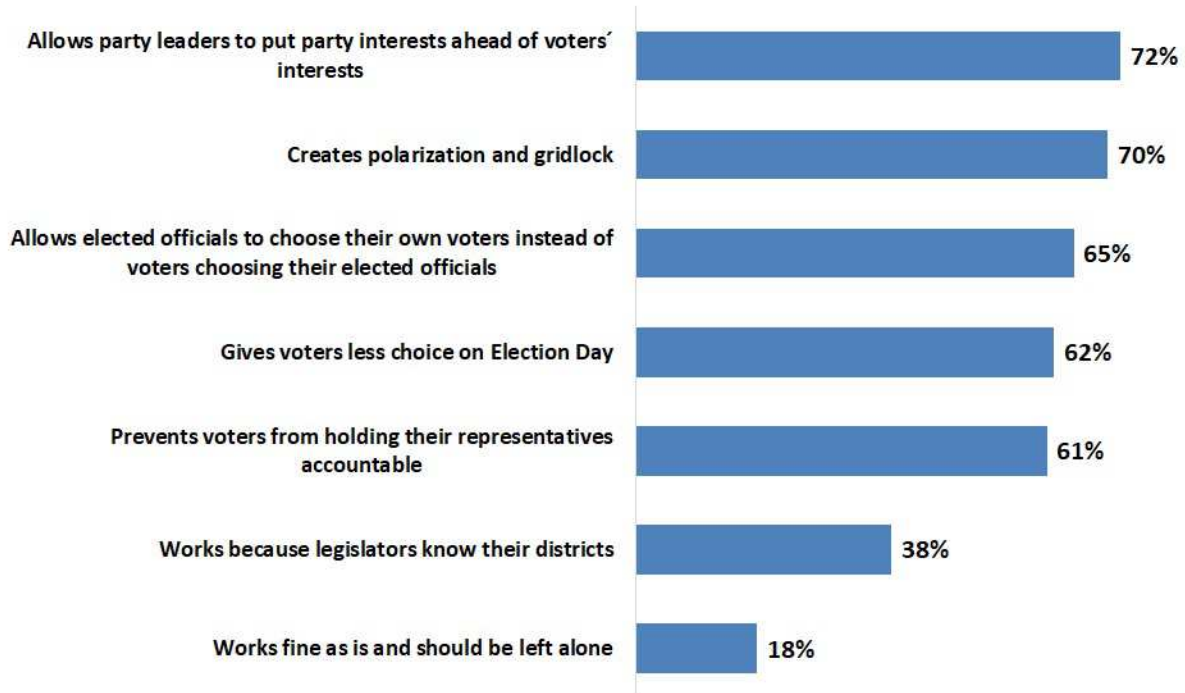
<sup>1</sup> Respondents were randomly assigned into one of two question formats when asking about knowledge. Half of respondents were asked if they felt they knew enough about “gerrymandering” to join in a conversation about the topic while the other half were asked if they felt they knew enough about “how voter maps are drawn” to join in a conversation about the topic. There were no significant differences in self-reported knowledge by question wording.

## Methodology

The survey findings presented in this release are based on the results of interviews conducted August 20 – September 10, 2019. The interviews were conducted at the Center for Opinion Research at Franklin & Marshall College. The poll was designed and administered by the staff of the Center for Opinion Research and was sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Pennsylvania. The data included in this summary represent the responses of 901 Pennsylvania registered voters, including 426 Democrats, 353 Republicans, and 122 independents. The sample of registered voters was obtained from L2, formerly Labels & Lists, and Marketing Systems Group. All sampled respondents were notified by letter about the survey. Interviews were completed over the phone and online depending on each respondent's preference. Survey results were weighted (age, gender, education, and party registration) using an iterative weighting algorithm to reflect the known distribution of those characteristics as reported by the Pennsylvania Department of State and exit polls from the 2018 Pennsylvania mid-term elections (specifically education).

The sample error for a survey with a sample size of 901 using standard calculations is +/- 3.3 percentage points, but including the estimated design effects from weighting for this survey produces a sample error of +/- 5.6 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, this poll is also subject to other sources of non-sampling error. Generally speaking, two sources of error concern researchers most. Non-response bias is created when selected participants either choose not to participate in the survey or are unavailable for interviewing. Response errors are the product of the question and answer process. Surveys that rely on self-reported behaviors and attitudes are susceptible to biases related to the way respondents process and respond to survey questions.
